County Lines, Gang & Knife Crime Safeguarding Training



Course Overview:

This course is a must for any professional working to support 'at risk' individuals in tackling this social issue.

A common feature in county lines drug supply is the exploitation of young and vulnerable people by drug gangs. Dealers will frequently target children and adults - often with mental health or addiction problems to act as drug runners or move cash so they can stay under the radar of law enforcement. In some cases dealers will take over a local property, normally belonging to a vulnerable person, and use it to operate their criminal activity.

People exploited in this way will quite often be exposed to physical, mental and sexual abuse, and in some instances will be trafficked to areas a long way from home as part of the network's drug dealing operations.

To protect themselves from the risks associated with drugs supply, young people and adults may feel the necessity to carry a knife and become affiliated to a gang.

Safeguarding and prevention is key to detecting victims and at-risk children, young people and vulnerable adults.
